ARIZONA FORWARD'S 44TH ANNUAL LUNCHEON SPOTLIGHTS LESSONS FROM NATURE

Featuring: Dr. Rafe Sagarin, Marine Ecologist, Environmental Policy Analyst & Author

PHOENIX (Nov. 25, 2013) – Nobody would expect to learn much from an octopus, but Arizona Forward's 44th Annual Luncheon from 11:30 a.m.-1:30 p.m., Fri., Dec. 6 will reveal how we can apply lessons from nature to business principles and human interaction.

This signature event will be held at the Arizona Biltmore featuring a keynote address by Dr. Rafe Sagarin, a University of Arizona professor and author of *Learning from the Octopus: How Secrets from Nature Can Help Us Fight Terrorist Attacks, Natural Disasters and Disease*. He reflects on adaptability and how secrets from nature can help people in their personal and professional lives while empowering society to create stronger, more livable and sustainable communities.

A marine ecologist and environmental policy analyst, Sagarin will address nearly 400 attendees. He'll share insights about how organisms have learned to thrive under the most difficult of conditions and offer perspective on how their lessons apply to today's business organizations.
