# INTRODUCTION

As we celebrate our 50th anniversary this year, we recognize that Arizona Forward is more than an organization that drives environmental and sustainability initiatives. Over the years, we have united communities in working toward one goal - a balance between economic vitality and environmental quality. ## Our History

In 1969, community leaders and organizations in the Valley began thinking about protecting our state's environment, which led to the formation of Valley Forward. Fundamental environmental issues in the Valley then, are similar to what they are today - mass transportation, air quality, water supplies, growth, economic vitality. Additionally, one key initiative, reclaiming and beautifying the Salt River, became a signature project for Arizona Forward.

In the early years of the organization, the Rio Salado project, championed by our Board member, the late, Jim Elmore, truly changed the footprint of Valley communities along the once dry riverbed. Valley Forward worked to create legislation to form the original Rio Salado Development District, establishing a legislative initiative to fund the development of a project that has today brought recreation, economic vitality, and habitat restoration to many Valley communities.

This project anchored our organization throughout the years and today, this torch continues to be carried forward by Arizona Forward, ASU and many Valley communities.

## A Growing Arizona

As Arizona Forward executed strategies and completed projects over the past five decades, our state was growing at a rapid pace. In 2013, Valley Forward expanded to a statewide organization to include developing urban and rural communities with a new name: Arizona Forward.

Growth brought economic prosperity to our state along with additional environmental challenges. Maintaining forest health, ensuring long term water supplies, controlling greenhouse gas emissions, and protecting natural resources are all issues of heightened concern.

As you will find in this report, we remain diligent in our efforts to develop collective strategies and to find sustainability solutions for the long term sustainability of Arizona.

## Arizona's Future

As the president and CEO of Arizona Forward, I am fully prepared to work hand-in-hand with the Arizona community, and our valuable members, to address the challenges and opportunities ahead. # REMEMBERING OUR HISTORY



Valley Forward was created to address anticipated growth in the Greater Phoenix area, and to proactively support environmental issues. As the state grew, the need to expand to a statewide organization was identified. Valley Forward transitioned to Arizona Forward in 2013.

# 2019 HIGHLIGHTS



## MAYOR AND COUNCIL FORUM

Arizona Forward invited the City of Phoenix Mayoral and Council candidates to participate in a forum with our members. Candidates shared their views and action plans as it related to sustainability and environmental issues.



## DROUGHT CONTINGENCY PLAN (DCP) FORUM

Many Arizona Forward members were involved in the Drought Contingency Planning process for Arizona and were instrumental in the agreement that was ultimately signed by Congress to reduce risks from ongoing drought and protect the single most important water resource in the western United States. Arizona Forward held a forum for expert panelists to provide a statewide perspective to our members on this critical issue for our state and the Lower Colorado River Basin.



## STATEWIDE SUSTAINABILITY SUMMIT

The record-breaking member attendance participated in conversations with leaders and experts to address Arizona issues in water, forest health, transportation and city resiliency. The summit feedback was incorporated into our Issue Committee strategies and guided our efforts to begin to formulate a Statewide Sustainability Roadmap.



## SUSTAINABLE TOURISM LUNCHEON

Arizona Forward hosted a luncheon in Flagstaff that focused on opportunities, challenges and solutions that encourage economic progression, while balancing the impacts an influx of tourism can have in the Northern regions of our state. Sustainable tourism respects both local people and the traveler, cultural heritage and the environment.

## EMERGING SUSTAINABILITY LEADERS PROGRAM

In May, 2019, 14 early to mid-level professionals graduated from the successful inaugural class, and 15 new professionals were selected for the program that began in October 2019. ## PROP 105 ADVOCACY

Arizona Forward advocated against the Prop 105 ballot initiative for the City of Phoenix including authoring an op-ed, sharing digital campaigns, and hosting informational meetings and phone banks. We are pleased with the outcome for Phoenix metro light rail system to continue to expand.



## CLIMATE CHANGE ROUNDTABLES WITH CONGRESS

Our members participated in roundtables with Congressman Stanton and O'Halleran and Senator Kyrsten Sinema's office to address the impacts of climate change in Arizona. These roundtables began a dialogue that will continue in 2020 and is one that will also be expanded to other Arizona congressional leaders.



## STATEWIDE AUTONOMOUS AND CONNECTED (AV/CVs) TRANSPORTATION TOWNHALLS

Members from Arizona Forward's Transportation Committee traveled across the state to collect feedback from communities about AV/CV adoption. The information collected from the townhalls will be provided to the Arizona legislature and statewide policy makers to help them prepare and plan for this transportation shift. A white paper will also be published by year end 2019.



## URBAN WATERWAYS

Arizona Forward's long-time support for the Grand Canalscape project was instrumental in the successful completion of this project in 2019 which will be celebrated in the spring of 2020. A section of a once dry riverbed west of downtown Tucson is now receiving treated effluent to restore the riparian area and help replenish aquifers as part of the Santa Cruz River Heritage Project. And, Arizona Forward continues to advocate for the Rio Reimagined project and the eight communities along the river corridor who are working to create a vibrant urban riverfront for the Valley.

# 39TH ANNUAL ENVIRONMENTAL EXCELLENCE AWARDS & 50TH ANNIVERSARY GALA

THE 2019 GALA WAS A RECORD-BREAKING EVENT WITH MORE THAN 650 REGISTRANTS AND 30 ELECTED OFFICIALS IN ATTENDANCE. A TOTAL OF 93 PROJECTS WERE RECOGNIZED, AND 50TH ANNIVERSARY AWARDS WERE PRESENTED TO ALL THREE STATE UNIVERSITIES.


